Charles Dickens

Charles Dickens is one of the most famous writers in the English language. He was born in Portsmouth in southern England on 7th February, 1812.

He was one of eight children and his family were very poor. When Dickens was ten years old his family moved to London, where Dickens had to leave school suddenly, as his father was sent to prison for debt. As the family had no money, Dickens was forced at the age of eleven to work in a boot polish factory, labelling bottles.

Yet in spite of his childhood hardships, Dickens managed to educate himself by attending Wellington House Academy in London for a short period, although he was largely self-taught. After his schooling, he spent two years as a law clerk. Then he became a reporter in

several jobs, the most notable one being for the newspaper the *Morning Chronicle*.

In 1836, Dickens published his first collection of short stories, "*Sketches by Boz*", which was followed by the humorous novel "*Pickwick Papers*". This was originally published, like much of Dickens' work, in a series of magazine episodes, before being later turned into a novel. Some of Dickens' most famous books include "*Oliver Twist*", "*A Christmas Carol*", "*David Copperfield*" and "*Great Expectations*". 1836 was also the year in which Dickens got married, and he had ten children.

Dickens was also interested in the theatre. In the last few years of his life, he gave many public readings of his books in which he would act out the stories and the parts of the characters in a one-man show. He died on 9th June 1870 and was buried in Westminster Abbey in London.

Great Expectations is one of Charles Dickens' most popular novels. It was first printed in a serialised form in the magazine *All the Year Round* between 1860 and 1861. It was an immediate success and was therefore published as a book in July 1861. It is a tale of love and adventure, with numerous twists and turns that hold our interest to the end.

The story is about an orphan called Pip, who dreams of moving up in society. A mysterious benefactor helps him to do so, but in becoming a gentleman Pip also has to go through a process of disillusionment and to learn new values.

Pip's desire for self-improvement is the main source of the novel's title. His expectations have not only to do with money, but also with moral, social and educational improvement. *Great Expectations* portrays characters from a variety of social classes, but Dickens makes it clear that a true gentleman is not identified by his money, but by his behaviour and attitudes towards others. Another important theme of the novel is that of crime, guilt and innocence. We learn that the justice of the courts does not always agree with a character's inner morality or conscience.

Film-makers have produced many different versions of *Great Expectations* over the years. Notably, the 1946 version became a screen classic, while the 1998 adaption aroused interest by setting the story in modern times.
