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Introduction

In B1 Preliminary, all four language skills are tested in four papers, as shown below.

PAPER 1

Reading (32 marks – 45 mins)

This paper has six tasks with a total of 32 questions.

Part 1 – Three-option multiple choice (5 marks)

Five short texts with one question each.

Test focus: reading short realistic texts (notices, messages and any other short texts) for the main message.

Part 2 – Multiple matching (5 marks)

Five descriptions of people to be matched to eight short texts on the same topic.

Test focus: reading for detail.

Part 3 – Four-option multiple choice (5 marks)

One long text followed by five questions.

Test focus: reading for detail, gist, inference and global meaning, as well as writer's attitude and opinion.

Part 4 – Gapped text (5 marks)

One long text from which five sentences have been removed. Candidates choose the correct sentences from a list of eight.

Test focus: reading for coherence and cohesion.

Part 5 – Four-option multiple-choice cloze (6 marks)

One shorter factual text with six gaps.

Test focus: reading and identifying appropriate vocabulary items, and sometimes grammar.

Part 6 – Open cloze (6 marks)

One shorter text with six gaps to be completed with one word each.

Test focus: reading and identifying appropriate grammatical structures, phrasal verbs and fixed phrases.

PAPER 2

Writing (40 marks – 45 mins)

In this paper, candidates complete two pieces of writing, with a maximum of 20 marks available for each. Candidates must answer Question 1, and either Question 2 or Question 3.

Part 1 – (Question 1) – An email (20 marks)

Write a short email in reply to an email with notes provided.

Part 2 – (Questions 2 & 3) – An article or a story (20 marks)

- Write an article answering questions from an announcement in a magazine or on a website.
- Write a story beginning with a given sentence.

Test focus (for all writing tasks): ability to communicate in writing, focussing on content, communicative achievement, organisation and language.

PAPER 3

Listening (25 marks – about 30 mins including 6 mins to transfer answers to the answer sheet)

This paper has four tasks with a total of 25 questions.

Part 1 – Three-option multiple choice (7 marks)

Seven questions with pictures as answer options.

Test focus: listening for specific information in short dialogues or monologues and selecting the correct visual.

Part 2 – Three-option multiple choice (6 marks)

Six listening texts with one question each.

Test focus: listening to short dialogues to identify gist.

Part 3 – Gap fill (6 marks)

Six gaps to fill with one or two words, or a number, date or time.

Test focus: listening to a monologue and completing the gaps in a page of notes or sentences.

Part 4 – Three-option multiple choice (6 marks)

Six questions on a longer interview.

Test focus: listening for detail, gist, attitude and opinion.

PAPER 4

Speaking (25 marks – 10-12 mins)

This paper has four tasks.

Part 1 – Personal/Factual information (2-3 mins)

The examiner asks each candidate in turn questions about personal details, daily routine, likes/dislikes, etc.

Test focus: responding to personal questions.

Part 2 – Extended turn with visual prompt (2-3 mins)

Each candidate describes one colour photograph.

Test focus: using descriptive language.

Part 3 – Discussion with visual prompts (2-3 mins)

Candidates are read a short imaginary situation and shown visual prompts to discuss it.

Test focus: using appropriate language to make or respond to suggestions, give reasons for opinions, discuss alternatives, and negotiate agreement.

Part 4 – General conversation (3-4 mins)

The examiner asks candidates questions based on the topic introduced in Part 3. The questions may be asked to one or both candidates, in turn or at the same time.

Test focus: using appropriate language to talk about personal experiences and share opinions.
