This passage is about an insect.

Most cricket species live in the biodiverse tropical regions of the world, but one species, the lava cricket, makes its home in one of the most lifeless places on the planet: volcanoes. Shortly after a volcano erupts, these insects suddenly appear on the hardened layers of lava. They are only found in Hawaii, where the locals have known about them for centuries, but researchers know very little about them.

Scientists find the lava cricket to be an extremely unusual example of a pioneer species. Pioneer species are the plants or animals which are the first to repopulate ecosystems that were once full of life, but became barren due to sudden changes to the environment. The most common pioneer species are simple plants like mosses that break down rock into soil. This soil allows more plants to grow there and the ecosystem slowly begins to recover. But where do lava crickets fit in this system? And more importantly, how do they survive where no other life exists? These questions about the lava cricket have puzzled researchers for decades. Adding to their mystery, lava crickets have a unique feature that makes them even less suited to survive in harsh conditions. Since they don't have wings like other species of crickets, they can't move quickly from place to place. Their lack of wings also makes it more difficult for them to chirp - or sing – in order to find a mate.

A scientific team from the University of Minnesota has set up a research station at one of Hawaii's most active volcanoes, Kilauea. The team will study the lava cricket to find out what makes it such a natural pioneer species. No matter what they discover, their research will certainly reveal some interesting insights into the life cycle of these unique insects.

This passage is about Antarctica.

Research has shown that scientists and tourists who visit Antarctica may unintentionally be polluting the Antarctic landscape. The unique environmental conditions of Antarctica have provided a natural "laboratory" for experiments that cannot be conducted anywhere else in the world. Such experiments have led to groundbreaking discoveries such as the hole in the ozone. However, using Antarctica for such purposes may be at the expense of altering its pristine environment.

Scientists fear that seeds brought into Antarctica via clothing, may take root and change Antarctic ecology. A study was conducted where the clothes and bags of 33,000 tourists and 7,100 researchers were vacuumed. The results showed each visitor unknowingly brought in an average of ten seeds. Not surprisingly, scientists, who generally spend more time outdoors, brought in five times more seeds. Now, invasive species, defined by their resilience and ability to spread quickly, are already growing around four research stations.

Another study involved taking seawater samples from an Antarctic research station. The findings showed the presence of ESBL, an enzyme that has the strength to destroy penicillin and antibiotics. This specific type of ESBL is common in bacteria in humans and proves that an alien bacterium has been introduced to a previously untouched environment.

Scientists are now looking into ways of minimizing non-native introductions as they can have an irreversible impact on the landscape. This is vital to maintain Antarctica as a valuable resource and more importantly, as one of the last frontiers of wilderness.



Seville State University Wins Carbon Champion of the Year

ast night, Seville State University (SSU) received national attention for its environmental program by winning the Carbon Champion of the Year award. The college won the award ahead of still competition from RSP Hospital, Hypermart, the Blue Rift Technology College, and the All-American Dance School.

This famous award is presented to the individual, team, or organization that has made the most outstanding contribution and commitment to helping the environment. SSU achieved this through numerous green projects. For example, the college reduced its use of gas by investing in renewable energy and replacing old heaters. They also created the Green Campus Trail which includes a nature area, peace garden, cycling facilities, and a vegetable garden, all of which include signs with information to educate people on the benefits of being more environmentally friendly.

Ariel Hyland, dean of the university, said, "It doesn't get much bigger than this in terms of recognition from the industry and we are very proud indeed." Leaders and sponsors of the projects will be invited to a ceremony at Stratton House on September 26th to be presented with the award.
